A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of Health and Human Services to establish a grant program to promote comprehensive mental health and suicide prevention efforts in schools, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Youth Mental Health
- 5 and Suicide Prevention Act".

SEC. 2. COORDINATED PROMOTION OF SCHOOL COM-
PREHENSIVE MENTAL HEALTH AND SUICIDE
PREVENTION PLANS.
(a) In General.—The Secretary, acting through the
Director of the Center for Mental Health Services of the
Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administra-
tion, may carry out a program to award grants, on a com-
petitive basis, to eligible entities to enhance services for
school-age youth with mental health and behavioral health
issues that can lead to low academic proficiency, low rates
of school attendance and graduation, and other negative
outcomes, including depression, substance abuse, and sui-
cide attempts.
(b) APPLICATION.—To be eligible for a grant under
this section, an eligible entity shall submit to the Secretary
an application in such form, at such time, and containing
such information as the Secretary determines appropriate,
including, at a minimum—
(1) a description of identified mental health and
behavioral health needs of school-age youth served
by such eligible entity;
(2) a description of revenue from Federal,
State, local, private, and institutional sources the eli-
gible entity has available to address the needs de-
scribed in paragraph (1);

1	(3) a description of the eligible entity's pro-
2	posed plan for using the grant funds to increase ac-
3	cess to evidence-based mental and behavioral health
4	services;
5	(4) a description of the eligible entity's pro-
6	posed plan for improving mental health equity and
7	assisting school-age youth most in need of mental
8	health services;
9	(5) a description of how such eligible entity will
10	involve, as appropriate, school-age youth and peer
11	representatives in the planning, implementation, and
12	evaluation processes related to the use of grant
13	funds and for purposes of achieving mental health
14	equity;
15	(6) a description of how such eligible entity will
16	support other school-age youth and the school com-
17	munity if a school-age youth attempts suicide or dies
18	by suicide;
19	(7) a plan to—
20	(A) implement the activities described in
21	subsection (e); and
22	(B) evaluate the outcomes of such activi-
23	ties; and

1	(8) an assurance that such eligible entity will
2	submit to the Secretary, for each fiscal year in which
3	grant funds are used, a report with respect to—
4	(A) the activities carried out under sub-
5	section (c); and
6	(B) the outcomes of such activities, re-
7	ported in accordance with the requirements of
8	section 444 of the General Education Provi-
9	sions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g; commonly known
10	as the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy
11	Act of 1974'').
12	(c) Allowable Uses of Grant Funds.—A grant
13	awarded under this section may be used by an eligible enti-
14	ty for—
15	(1) evaluating existing program activities and
16	prevention strategies;
17	(2) educational seminars;
18	(3) educational awareness campaign materials
19	for school-age youth, families of school-age youth,
20	and school staff to increase the awareness of poten-
21	tial mental and behavioral health issues of school-
22	age youth;
23	(4) peer-to-peer program support;
24	(5) programs that assist schools in adopting a
25	public health approach to mental health;

1	(6) social media applications used for mental
2	and behavioral health purposes, such as suicide risk
3	and mental health screenings;
4	(7) providing mental health services for school-
5	age youth through telehealth;
6	(8) training programs for school-age youth and
7	teachers, school leaders, and other school personnel
8	to learn to respond effectively to school-age youth
9	with mental health and behavioral health issues that
10	can lead to low academic proficiency, low rates of
11	school attendance and graduation, and other nega-
12	tive outcomes, including depression, substance
13	abuse, and suicide attempts; and
14	(9) providing culturally-specific mental health
15	and substance use education and prevention pro-
16	grams for school-age youth.
17	(d) Geographical Representation.—In awarding
18	grants under this section, the Secretary shall ensure that
19	grant funds are distributed with the greatest possible geo-
20	graphical representation, including to State and local edu-
21	cational agencies that serve rural areas.
22	(e) Technical Assistance.—The Secretary may
23	provide technical assistance to grantees in carrying out
24	this section.
25	(f) Study and Report.—

1	(1) Study.—For each fiscal year during which
2	grants are awarded under this section, the Secretary
3	shall conduct a study on the results of the grant
4	program.
5	(2) Report.—For each study conducted under
6	paragraph (1), the Secretary shall submit to Con-
7	gress a report on the results of such study, includ-
8	ing—
9	(A) an evaluation of the outcomes of the
10	grant program, including a summary of activi-
11	ties carried out by eligible entities and the re-
12	sults of such activities; and
13	(B) recommendations with respect to im-
14	proving access to mental health and behavioral
15	heath services at schools, including efforts to
16	reduce the occurrence of suicide and substance
17	abuse.
18	(g) Definitions.—In this section:
19	(1) Eligible entity.—The term "eligible enti-
20	ty'' means—
21	(A) a local educational agency;
22	(B) a State educational agency; or
23	(C) an Indian Tribe or Tribal organization.
24	(2) ESEA TERMS.—The terms "local edu-
25	cational agency" and "State educational agency"

1	have the meanings given such terms in section 8101
2	of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of
3	1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).
4	(3) Indian tribe; tribal organization.—
5	The terms "Indian Tribe" and "Tribal organiza-
6	tion" have the meanings given the terms "Indian
7	tribe" and "tribal organization", respectively, in sec-
8	tion 4 of the Indian Self-Determination and Edu-
9	cation Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
10	(4) School-age youth.—The term "school-
11	age youth" means—
12	(A) individuals between the ages of 5 and
13	17, inclusive; and
14	(B) children with disabilities, as defined in
15	section 602(3) of the Individuals with Disabil-
16	ities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1401(3)), who
17	receive services under part B of such Act (20
18	U.S.C. 1411 et seq.).
19	(5) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
20	the Secretary of Health and Human Services, in
21	consultation with the Secretary of Education and
22	the heads of other appropriate agencies.
23	(h) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

1	(1) In general.—There are authorized to be
2	appropriated such sums as may be necessary to
3	carry out this section.
1	(2) Set-Aside.—Of the amount appropriated
5	to carry out this section for a fiscal year, 10 percent
5	shall be reserved for grants to eligible entities that
7	serve Indian Tribes or Tribal organizations.
